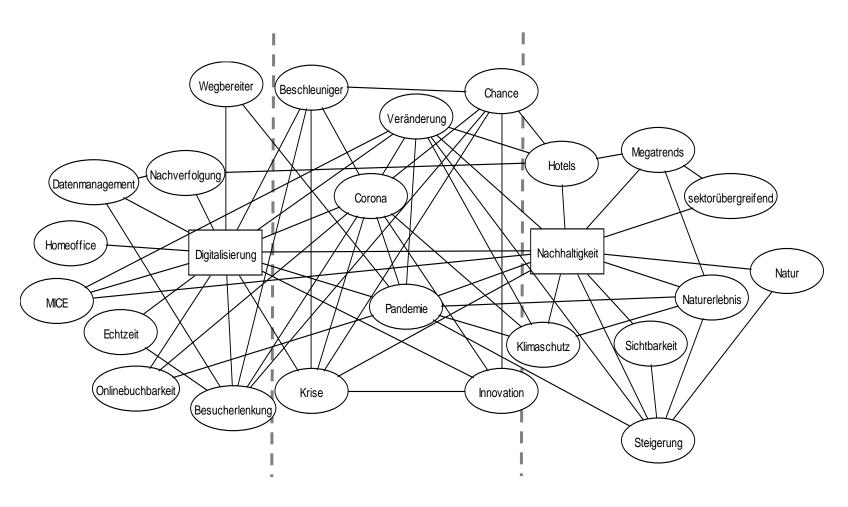
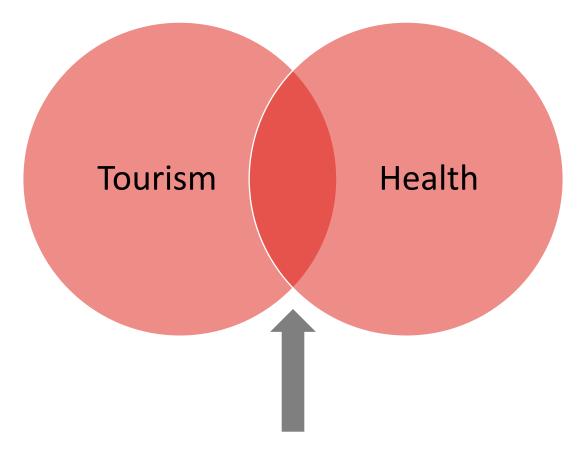
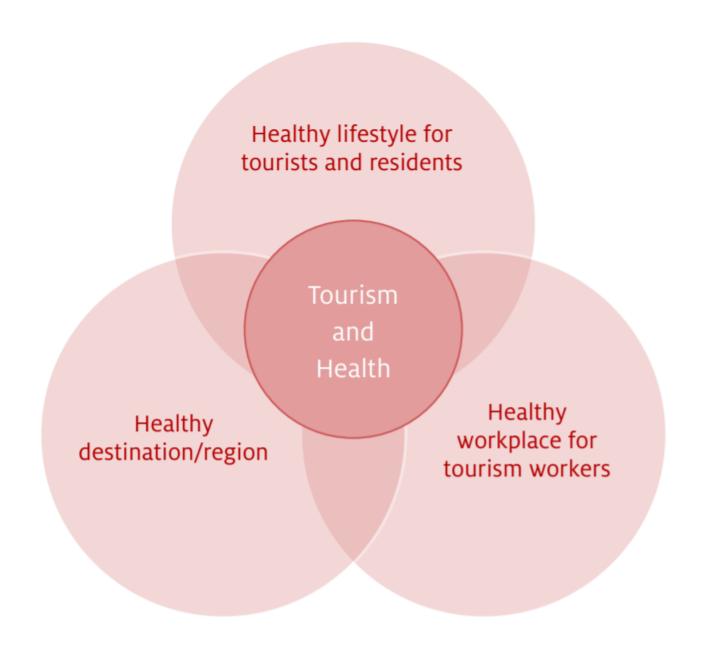


Fig. 2: Area of tension between Corona, digitalisation and sustainability Source: own representation, based on WinRelan®

#### Conceptualisating Public Health in the Context of Sustainable Tourism

**Public health** can be defined as what "we as a society do collectively to assure the conditions in which people can be healthy" (Institute of Medicine, 1988).

- Nexus of: Environment Health Well-Being
- Ecosystem services illustrate how the state/quality of the environment is critical to human health and wellbeing
- Environmental Health Public Health
- Environmental & public health are crucial for a healthy & sustainable destination

#### Main objectives:

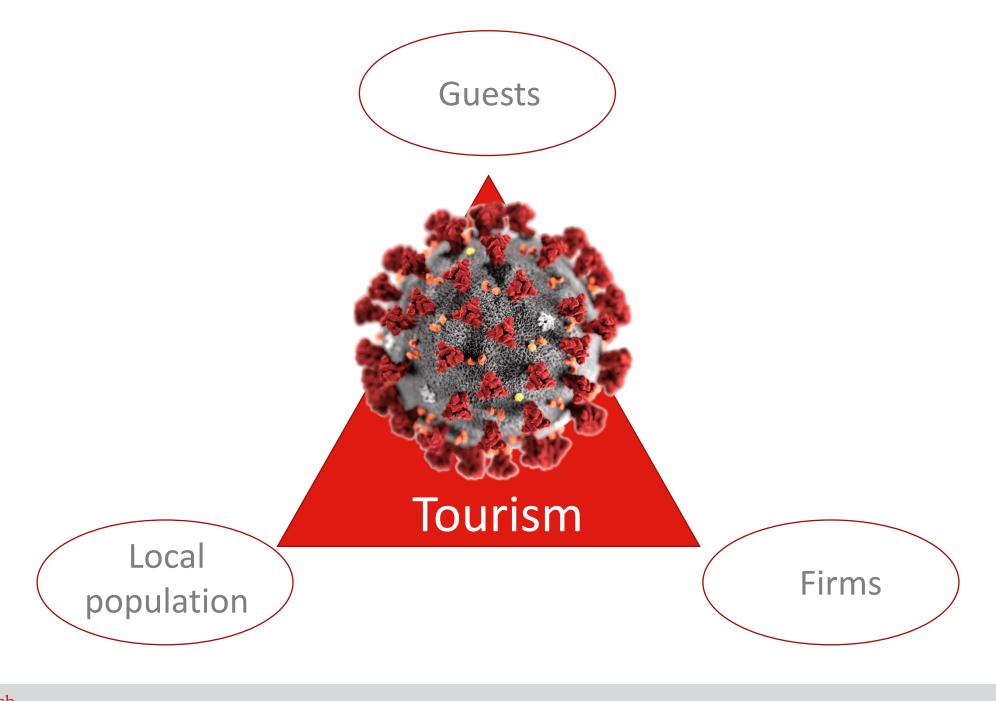
- Offer a theoretical contribution to the conceptualisation and measurement of sustainable tourism
- Support the local DMO and the regional government in developing policies, strategies, plans and management processes for sustainable tourism (i.e., support evidence-based policy-making)

#### **Activities:**

- Systematic, timely and regular monitoring of tourism performance and impact at the highest data granularity possible (13 issue areas, 3 dimensions, 31 indicators)
- Reporting: yearly report + website (<u>https://sustainabletourism.eurac.edu/</u>)







### COVID-19 AND PUBLIC HEALTH: VACATION STYLES OF CAUTIOUS AND ADVENTUROUS GUESTS

#### **SOUTH TYROL**

Representative guest survey (n=874)

- Mostly domestic (Italian) guests
- seeking for more isolation
- trying to collect information about on-site conditions
- showing higher levels of skepsis towards other guests.



(Cautious guests)



- international guests, especially Germans,
- seeking for less additional data or information on site than cautious guests,
- much less sceptical towards other guests
- less isolated and to practice more outdoor activities

(Carefully adventurous guests)

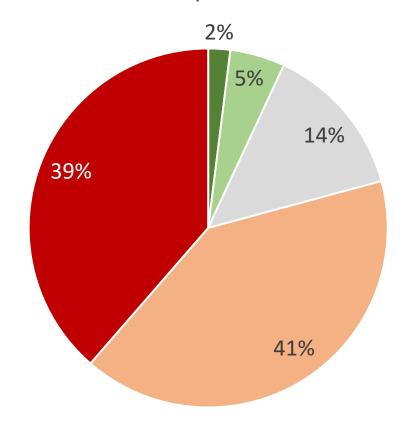

In your opinion, did tourism have an impact on Covid-19 numbers in South Tyrol?

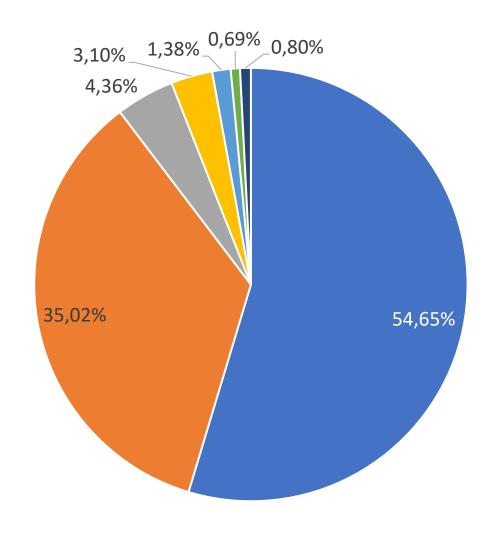


■ strongly decreased ■ somewhat decreased ■ no impact ■ somewhat increased ■ strongly increased

#### **COUNTRY OF ORIGIN OF GUESTS**



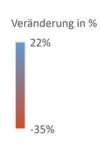

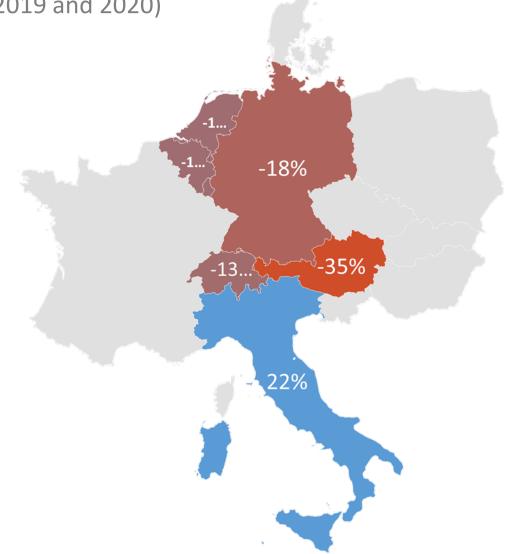

#### **CONCLUSION & OUTLOOK**

#### THE ROLE OF MONITORING FOR A RESPONSIBLE RESTART OF TOURISM

Monitoring the guests' and the local population's needs and perceptions can help destinations to:

- React to changing demands of guests (e.g., introduce new hygiene measures)
- **Restore trust** in times of uncertainty (e.g., transparent and proactive communication on the measures put in place)
- Identify critical attitudes towards tourism among the local population and address their concerns (e.g., hotspot management)
- Covid-19 pandemic presents not only a challenge, but also a unique opportunity for a sustainable reorientation of tourism
  - > transformation should be guided by evidence-based policy-making
  - **Example**: local DMO is implementing sustainability in tourism based on the data collected by our INSTO observatory

#### **CONCLUSION & OUTLOOK**

- Thinking public & environmental health together to create a healthier, more sustainable and more resilient destination
- Focus on readiness of public health system:
  - Is the public health system ready to react to unforeseen events?
  - Is it ready to respond to the needs of tourists in times of Covid-19?
- Need to identify suitable indicators to monitor public & environmental health
  - Infrastructures, services and experiences
  - What kind of data is already available? -> complement existing indicators with own surveys

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
